Florida Public Archaeology Network & UWF Historic Trust open new exhibit at the T.T. Wentworth, Jr. Florida State Museum in celebration of Florida Archaeology Month and FPAN's ten year anniversary

PENSACOLA– March 13, 2015- The Florida Public Archaeology Network and UWF Historic Trust have opened a new exhibition on the third floor of the T.T. Wentworth, Jr. Florida State Museum titled “Your Florida Archaeology.” The exhibit will be open from March 12 – June 12, 2015.

The exhibit is in celebration of Florida Archaeology Month and FPAN’s ten year anniversary. “Your Florida Archaeology” features information about Florida Archaeology Month, the creation of FPAN, and information and artifacts recovered from several different types of archaeological sites by faculty and graduate students in the University of West Florida Department of Anthropology and Archaeology over the past few years.

The Wentworth Museum is part of UWF Historic Trust. Admission to the complex is \$6.00/adults, \$5.00/AAA, Senior 65+, Active Military and Dependents, and \$3.00/Children 3-15. Tickets are good for one week.

The museum houses a treasure trove of artifacts displaying West Florida's rich heritage. Named after local historian and collector, T.T. Wentworth, Jr., the museum recently celebrated its 55th anniversary. The Wentworth Museum offers three floors of exhibit space with permanent exhibits on the first floor and changing exhibits on the second floor. The third floor is a large gallery for traveling exhibits.
